In his letter to me from abroad he sent me what he had written about you, and it was published in the Modern Review and will also be published in the new book of 'Letters from Abroad' which is just coming out. He said you are so 'human' and love of science had only increased your love of nature and your 'human' outlook. I am putting it all very badly — while he put it perfectly.

If therefore you are able to write I do hope you will do so and I can assure you that it will be studied and read with utmost care.
